Casual Evangelization Spiritual Mission: Servant's Heart

Goal: Our call as men in understanding our spiritual mission

Service is a key element of God's Kingdom. Jesus Himself came to earth "not to be served, but to serve" (Mark 10:45). But in order to serve, especially in today's self-seeking society, we must learn what service is and how to have a servant's heart before God.

Opening Prayer

The Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10: 30-37)

Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead.

A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side.

Likewise a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side.

But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight.

He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn and cared for him.

The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, 'Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back.'

Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?"

He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Reread in silence and reflect on the words in these parables. Imagine yourself on this same road and approaching a beat up man on the side of the road.

What word/ phrase speaks to your heart?

What does the parable tell us about the type of heart God desires for you?

A character in this parable that may be overlooked is the innkeeper. The innkeeper may not have seen the victim beat up and lonely on the road but is now entrusted to continue care for the man. What can we do to develop a servant's attitude/ heart in all we do?

Mark 10: 43-45

But it shall not be so among you. Rather, whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all.

For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Consider the word / theme "compassion". It is an emotion that Jesus feels & is moved with compassion when seeing the sick come to Him. How can we grow in compassion? How can we better recognize the wounds of our close family and friends?

- At its core, service means sacrifice: giving up your whole life for God and others rather than yourself, and God promises a crown of glory and eternal life to those who are willing to sacrifice their lives in this world.
